Pastor Thulie Beresford, Guest Preacher &
Teaching Theologian

This Sunday, September 22nd!

From Pastor Jon: I found Pastor Thulie's life story very compelling. As such, I hesitated to cut anything from her autobiography.



My name is Thulisiwe Ndelu Beresford. My maiden name is Ndelu. I am originally from South Africa and have lived in the US for 32 years. In my culture names have special meanings. After having two boys my mother was crying a lot wondering if she would ever have a girl. So, when I was born my father told my mother that she had been stopped from crying. My name, Thulisiwe, means “Condolence.” For my Western friends I use “Thulie” (2Lee).

After having taught for 2 years at a Community College in South Africa, I received a scholarship to do my master's degree in Biology at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio. This is where I first met a female Lutheran pastor. I had wanted to be a pastor after a faith transforming tragic event, but the Lutheran Church in South Africa was not yet ordaining women. I shared with my campus pastor, Patricia Lull, that I wanted to be a pastor and she told me to finish my degree and go back to South Africa and that if I still felt the call, the congregation (Christ Lutheran Church) would sponsor my seminary education. So, for me, Lutheran Campus Ministry holds a key place in my life; I was loved, received, and supported by the entire congregation as I attended seminary and beyond.

I am a graduate of Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio where I met my husband to be, Charles Michael. My host father through Lutheran Campus Ministry walked me down the aisle when I got married. I still go back to Athens, Ohio to visit the congregation that was my home church when I was away from my home church in South Africa.

My first call was in Flint, MI where I served Salem Lutheran Church for 14 years. One of the many joys about serving in Flint, MI was receiving *The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Drum Major Award* from the Mayor of the City of Flint, Woodrow Stanley, for my work with the less fortunate young

people and their families in the neighborhood, plus also working for racial reconciliation in the city. I was also a member of the University of Michigan-Flint Citizens Advisory Committee whereby we worked to bring together the Community and the University. In 2009 we moved to South Carolina because my husband was offered a job by the navy in the Charleston Area. My husband is a civilian computer programmer for SPAWAR.

While in South Carolina, I have served as a parish pastor, hospital and retirement community chaplain. I served as a Lutheran Campus Pastor at The Citadel, as well as College of Charleston/MUSC/Charleston School of Law. After the Mother Emanuel Massacre I worked with the Jewish Student Association, Unitarian, and Roman Catholic campus ministers from the College of Charleston and we sponsored an event for the college and the community to talk about healing the wounds of racism and beginning to work with people from all walks of life. The event was successful.

My husband, Charles and I have two live children. Our daughter, Khabonina, meaning “Related to the Household of Mother” graduated from Ohio University this past Spring. She is a Social Worker and is currently working with AmeriCorps in Spartanburg, South Carolina. Our son, Charles Ndelu, graduated from Fort Dorchester High School this spring and is now a first year student at Clemson.

I am currently working as a part-time chaplain at the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC).

I am a die-hard Lutheran. My paternal ancestors were among the very first converts of the German Lutheran Missionaries in South Africa, so I have always been a Lutheran.

It was a great honor to preach at the very first *Rostered Minister’s Gathering* in Atlanta, GA, in August of 2017. I preached at the opening worship service, which set the tone for reconciliation among those gathered that we all had to take that message of reconciliation back to our hometowns. In August of 2019, captured images from my 2017 preaching

were displayed at the ELCA's Church-wide Assembly during the worship service.

I am currently doing a DMin. program with United Lutheran Seminary in Philadelphia. I started the program in the Spring/Summer of 2018.

SOME OTHER THINGS ABOUT ME:

1. I was featured in the Charleston Post and Courier for having asked the President of The Dietrich Bonhoeffer Institute (TDBI), The Rev. Dr. Robert Schenck, if as a Christian of Color I mattered to my white Christian brothers and sisters. I wanted to know if my white Christian brothers and sisters loved me enough to fight against what kept me oppressed in the world in which I live.
2. I was one of the Chaplains on call at the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC) on the day of the Mother Emanuel Massacre on June 17, 2015.
3. I am part of the South Carolina Synod, ELCA's Inclusiveness Network (INET) and was trained to help congregations and communities on healing the wounds of racism.



Recycling & Composting Volunteers Needed!

Recycling volunteers needed! Did you know that Clemson does not do curbside recycling for businesses and that includes us, a church? However, the city has provided us with 6 free recycling buckets and has agreed that one of us can take the buckets to our own curbside for recycling. **We're looking for 4 volunteers who would be willing to take home a green bin about once every month to their curb, and bring back the empty within the next two weeks.** There's no schedule. You just pick up a full bin from our kitchen and next time you're at church return the empty bin to church. If there's enough of us, no one will have to do this often. Sometimes I have the empty green bin at my home for several weeks, because I forget to bring it back. But that's no

Do you compost? We now have two plastic ice cream buckets in the church kitchen marked "COMPOST." If you have a compost bin at home and are eating a meal at church, please put the plastic bin out (next to the trash can) before a meal you are attending. Then, take it home after the dinner. You can return the cleaned empty plastic bin the next time you come to church. Note: If there's no volunteer offering to take home the plastic bin that meal, no plastic bin should be put out by the trash can.


