

FROM PASTOR JON

The number of new Covid-19 cases continue to decline in our four county area, but we remain at risk. The City of Clemson has extended its mask ordinance through March 15, yet also with the hope that we will continue to see cumulative decline in the next several weeks. Good news.

UniLu now has over 60 people (out of approximately 340) who have received their two shots of vaccine and some have cleared the waiting period after that. Again, wonderful news. Yes, it feels like more light is shining at the end of a very long tunnel.

With the hope of improving weather the Worship & Music Committee has currently scheduled two outdoor worship services in March.

On March 14 at 11 AM we'll gather in our upper parking lot on Sloan Street for worship. Please wear your mask, bring your own chairs and practice physical distancing.

On March 21 we will meet at 4 PM at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Clemson in their new outdoor space, "Trinity Place." (Same worship guidelines as for March 14.)

Following these two worship experiences we'll review what went well and where we can make modifications. Then we can put plans together for Palm Sunday March 28 and Easter Sunday April 4. What is guaranteed, is that on all four of these Sundays (March 14 – April 4) we will have our regular 9 AM Facebook Live service.

Thanks again for your patience as we seek to show our love for our neighbors by trying to stamp out the virus.

THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Our *Tuesdays Together* Lenten Bible Study got me thinking about things that we are called to do as Children of God and followers

of Jesus. Our bible study is titled *Faces of Christ*. Yesterday we looked at the portrait of Jesus in the gospels of Mark and John, which are the gospels we will be reading this Lent. We also looked at how Martin Luther saw Christ. Luther says we should be like Christ to others. He also wants us to see Christ in others. The following quote comes from Luther's Commentary on

the Gospel of John.

"God says, 'I do not choose to come to you in my majesty and in the company of angels but in the guise of a poor beggar asking for bread. ... I want you to know that I am the one who is suffering hunger and thirst."

We are called not just to help and be like Christ to our neighbor, we are also called to see Christ in others, even "the least of these my brethren." That puts a whole new light on not only our giving but also our daily relationships with all of God's people.

RECONCILING IN CHRIST DISCUSSION




Dear Congregation,

KEEP FAMILY PROMISE ALIVE!

Judith White, of First Baptist of Clemson found a way to do so by interviewing JoAnn Brink at Family Promise. She then reviewed the interview

with her Sunday School class.

Here is the interview:

1. Are there tasks that are more service oriented or do you view all work you do as serving GOD?

I believe that our purpose in life is to love and serve God and each other. We serve God by serving others. Further, I believe that we are expected to work

toward common good, social conditions in which all humans can flourish.

2. How do you prepare and keep up with all the different groups you serve?

I strive to achieve and demonstrate cultural competence, to understand the cultures of the people I serve and approach them with sensitivity and respect. It is our job to continually learn more about different cultures and their values so we better understand our guests. Better educating myself is a priority for me, whether by reading or attending virtual trainings. Last autumn I audited a college course called "Race and American Christianity."

3. How has this pandemic changed the way you serve?

Many of you have heard me advise that we must be flexible in serving our guests. The pandemic has challenged us to be extremely flexible, creative, and on-going in recognizing needs and modifying what we do. We have continued offering sheltering services throughout the pandemic.111 We are sheltering families by paying for motels now. This has led to the requirement that guests must have a vehicle to be accepted into the program. Because so many folks come to us with old and faulty vehicles, we have had to take on the role of sometimes assisting with car repairs. Because meals are not being cooked and served by the congregations, we have asked our network churches to conduct drives for restaurant and grocery gift cards. Additionally, we have requested hand sanitizer and masks (mostly children's) from the volunteers so these can be provided to the guests. There have been some issues to work out with the motel such as spotty wi-fi. Since the majority of case management is being done by email, it is necessary for guests to have access. When I do have case management meetings in person, they are held outside, rain or shine, cold or warm! While we still have the expectation that parents work, we've had to be flexible when single parents have to accommodate children doing virtual weeks of school or having to quarantine.

Because there is emergency funding available to respond to people in need caused by COVID, Armilla has written proposals and accessed these funds, enabling us to begin offering prevention services, to prevent folks from becoming homeless. We have a part-time case manager to manage those cases. At intake, we look at whether someone's needs could be met through prevention instead of sheltering. Thus far, more than 60 people have

benefitted from our prevention program!

4. How do you handle the numerous disappointments that service bringsespecially when its untimely?

I have been doing social work for 34 years. Early on, I came to the resolution that I would do my very best every day, particularly in terms of what is best for the children. When I lie down at night, I want to feel satisfied that I have offered the very best that I can. That practice has helped me greatly in handling disappointments.

At Family Promise, we always give the guest who is not complying with their service plan numerous chances with clearly communicated warnings before we unsuccessfully complete them. This is done in an effort to be fair but mostly because we are so concerned about the children. Yet, it is the situations in which we have to make a family leave the program that do disappoint me and lead me to carefully review all that we did looking for any little thing we might have done differently or better.

5. How does this scripture speak to you?

1 John 3:18 Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth.

God cares deeply for the poor and vulnerable. He expects His followers to also care. More than that, we are to act on that care. This can be challenging when we are sometimes faced with folks who are unthankful. Some people have not been taught to be thankful; others come to us emotionally wounded and shut down by being neglected, rejected or abused. This is when folks need our caring attitudes and kind actions more than ever!

6. Do you feel Christian service is also humanitarian work?

Yes, I believe that the gospel mandates us to serve each other, especially those who are needy and vulnerable. Whatever we do for the least of people, we do for Him.

7. What is fun about your job?

Spending time with the children is always joyful! Although the pandemic has severely limited that, I still find ways to attend to them. Recently, I took

two stuffed pink unicorns out to the car to give to two very excited little girls!

Seeing our guests succeed is so gratifying! When they are excited about a new job at McDonald's or open their first savings account, we share their excitement.

We are so blessed with truly exceptional coordinators. Interacting with them is always fun. Also, I enjoy speaking to groups, doing trainings and presenting about Family Promise.

And then a further note from JoAnn:

At this time we have one family in the sheltering program. After they stayed in the motel for a few weeks, both to ensure they were COVID-free and also to prove trustworthiness, we recently moved them into the house that we are so blessed to use at Easley Presbyterian Church. The family is a single mother who is pregnant and has two young children. So many of our guests decline our offer to assist them with getting into a GED-preparation program. I'm so proud of this young woman! She has been attending the Parenting & Family Literacy program and so far has passed two of the three sections of the GED. We are so appreciative of your continued support of Family Promise. We could not do this without you!
